From the Rector, October 2007

Close your eyes and remember what life in the congregation was like two years ago! Alright, open them again. You do have to read this, and it might be difficult with your eyes closed. With your eyes open (in all senses), try and remember the time of the parish survey, circa 2005. I know that some of us were not here, but even if you were not, attempt to imagine what the parish might have been like. It was a time of great transition. David Carlson had just moved to the city. Betsy Roadman was here in a new capacity. Everyone was dreaming of and imagining what this parish could be, how a new Rector might participate and lead us in that process. I can only imagine that it must have been a time of great hope and great fear (What if we get the wrong person?).

Of course, I was not here. I am only imagining and piecing together bits of other people's memories and what life was like for me at the same time. But one of the reasons that I look back to that era is that.... Drum roll please! We are there again! We are in a place of discerning our future, thinking about who we want to be, and dreaming how our leadership might guide us there. We **GET TO BE** in a point of transition. I have heard many wise people say that our lives are like spiral staircases, that we keep coming around to the same views and points of life, but ideally, we are farther up and along in the journey. And I do believe that we here at St. A's are farther along than we were several years ago. But we are at the same point in the circle again. Luckily, like then, there is a group of good people that is very specifically charged with leading us through the process of discernment and imagining of what our parish can be. It is the Discernment Committee.

Over the past weekends, at church, Greg Kaebnick, Joe Kolanko, and I have talked about the first step in that process. We are going to ask you to participate in a new survey process. Right now, you should either have a survey in hand or will receive it in the mail shortly. In answering the survey, I ask that you take time to think and feel and pray your way through the answers. Look back to our shared history **AND envision our shared future**. The specific goal of the committee is to facilitate deciding how we can accommodate our current parishioners in our church building and how we might be able to welcome in more people to our flock. It is a lovely, wonderful, beautiful situation to face, but it is one that we want to

make with thought, care, discernment, and prayer. And we need your help. As one parishioner said after our first weekend back at Sunday School, with the pews overflowing and joy abounding: ***we have a lot of discerning to do!***

And we do! Even after the surveys, we will be seeking your input. As in the Rector search that resulted in *moi*, in October, we will begin a series of meetings and dinners to help us think through our possibilities. You probably know the two prevailing options: either we add more seating with a choir loft or enlarging the nave where the congregation sits AND/OR we create another service. There are many benefits and problems for all of our options, and we need your input in multiple ways so that the Vestry can make informed decisions.

Some of the things that came out of the last parish survey were a desire to focus on our Sunday School and outreach and community events. And we have focused on those things. We now participate in the Carpenter's Kids program in Tanzania, and we have continued to give a lot of thought and care to the Sunday School curriculum. We also have adult education programs led by our Deacon and a bookgroup assisted by me. And, fourteen of us have just returned from Heifer International's Overlook Farm in Rutland, Massachusetts. There, we learned about international outreach and what life is like in many developing nations. We cared for the animals that will be shared with people who are poor in our own country. And we can trace all of these events and trips back to the previous parish survey. It was a moment of definition for us and continues to be.

All of this is to say that in two years, I hope that we are seeing fulfillment of the goals that we are making for ourselves in this discernment process! No matter what we decide, or where we feel led, I do hope that we look back and feel that this process has brought us closer together and closer to the love of God. I continually thank God for being led here to this wonderful, caring community. I pray that we will work together to find where God is leading us together.

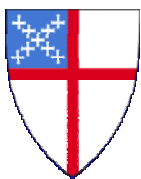

**Treasurer's Report:** The Church's financial operations, although healthy, have deteriorated somewhat since my last report, which is not unusual given the reduced church attendance during the summer months. Expenses were generally lower than expectations. Administrative expense has come in lower than expected as we were without a Parish Administrator during July and August. Property expenses came in lower than expected due to the relatively mild winter and a reduction in our sewer taxes. Priest also came in lower, since we had budgeted for a full year for an Assistant Priest, rather than the actual of eight months. Outreach was close to budget after the expenditure of monies to organizations recommended by the Outreach Committee (\$2,600 during July, and funded from a portion of JuneFest revenues). Program expenses were higher than the budget, due mostly to added investment in our Sunday School program. The reason for the significant increase in our deficit is the lag in revenues during the last two months, especially pledges. JuneFest raised \$20,988 (remarkably close to the \$21,000 in the budget). Space Use continues to fall below expectations, with revenues 45% lower than budgeted. Current Year Pledges were budgeted at \$95,000 for the end of August. Of that amount, only \$80,000 has actually been received, leaving a \$15,000 shortfall in pledge revenues. Although expenses were generally lower than expected, they were not low enough to make up for this revenue shortfall, resulting in an actual deficit of (\$7,658) versus the budgeted deficit of (\$1,371). Hopefully, as attendance picks up with the start of a new Sunday

School year, Current Year Pledges will also recover to their expected levels, eliminating the larger than expected operating deficit.

**Phelps Memorial Hospital Center announces its Chaplain Training Program.** The program is designed to prepare lay or ordained volunteers to minister to patients and visitors in the Hospital. In a supervised setting, with peer support, the chaplains-in-training will learn about hospital care, about themselves as pastors, and with study and practice, about the theology and skills of pastoral care in an interfaith setting. ## The Episcopal Shield

Several crosses appear on the shield. The large, red cross that divides the shield is a cross of St. George, the cross of the Church of England, and it represents our ties with our mother church.

There are nine small crosses in the upper left quadrant arranged in a St. Andrew's cross, the cross of the Church of Scotland. When no Anglican bishop would ordain a bishop for the fledgling Protestant Episcopal Church in the USA, bishops of the Church of Scotland agreed to lay hands on Samuel Seabury, ordaining him the first bishop of the ECUSA. This cross honors the part the Church of Scotland played in the birth of our church.

Each of the nine small crosses that comprise the St. Andrew's cross represents one of the nine dioceses that in 1789 founded the ECUSA.

The shield's layout, which is reminiscent of the American flag (the founding fathers of the ECUSA were also the founding fathers of our country), and its red, white, and blue motif signify that the ECUSA is the American representative to the Anglican Communion. The colors each have a symbolic meaning: Red is for the blood Christ shed for us and for the lives of the martyrs of our faith; White is the color of purity; Blue is the traditional color of the Virgin Mary, the mother of the Son of Man.
