From the Rector:

I have been re-watching a favorite 1990's show, "The Vicar of Dibley." If you have never seen it, then you have really missed something. The show was about a woman priest at a time in England when that was novel and strange. In the episode, "Christmas Lunch", the Vicar, Geraldine Granger speaks with a friend Alice, whose head has a bit too much air, about the Vicar's upcoming Christmas sermon. Here is an excerpt:

Alice: I'm totally excited about your first Christmas sermon, Vicar. It's just gonna be an experience I will never forget.

Vicar: Alice, my first Christmas Sermon was last Christmas.

Alice: Oh yeah, I forgot. But it's you're fault. You probably just chose a boring subject.

Vicar: The birth of Jesus Christ, otherwise known as the greatest story ever told?

Alice: Well yeah, [it's good the] first time you hear it, but after that, it's a bit predictable, isn't it? Man and woman get to inn. Inn full. Woman has baby in manger. Angels sing on high. Blah, blah, blah....

Vicar: You have forgotten to mention that that baby is in fact the Son of God.

Alice: Yeah, that's a nice twist.

Frankly, sometimes I agree with Alice. The story of Christmas is predictable; sometimes, it feels blah, blah, blah, and it has a nice twist! The Nativity is predictable, because even as adults, we hear the same story from Christmas pageants past rolling around in our heads. The story feels blah, because it is difficult to make this story relevant to our time. Virgin births? Nasty kings? Sleeping in hay? What does that have to say to us? BUT, and here's the thing, the story has a nice twist. Because if we let it, the Christmas story can captivate hope and possibility within us.

God sending God into the world in the form of a helpless child is a noble experiment in God trusting us to bring God's love into the world. And the experiment was successful. People, like Mary and Joseph, who were afraid suddenly found themselves nurturing God. An innkeeper let them stay in their stable. Shepherds, the people who were disgusting, came to worship. And astrologers from the East came bearing gifts. Many people have and continue to nurture God's love in the world.

God comes into the world as a pebble tossed into a lake. There is just a small initial impact, but the waves ripple outward, which is the message of Advent. The season of Advent invites us to recall and imagine how God comes into the world. True, there are many days when I wish God would come in clouds and take away all the mean people. But instead, at Christmas we remember that God gives us the love to challenge the mean people, including ourselves. And that is who Jesus is: the love to help us. The love that is with us and the love which challenges us. God is a pebble thrown into a lake, water rippling toward the shore

I know that the season leading up to Christmas is not calm or easy. The world seems frantic with demands and gifts. But our message is that love has arrived, tossed into our world. And we're inviting ourselves into the ripple effect. Merry Christmas!

Our operating performance for the first nine months of 2011 reflects the slowdown in revenues we typically experience after the slow summer months; our actual shortfall of revenues over expenditures is in excess of -\$18,000 v. the -\$5,000 contained in the budget. This means that the revenues we have received to date were not sufficient to pay all of our bills, and we have had to dip into our reserves. Expenses have been slightly lower than expected in most categories as we continue to operate our church and other buildings and programs as prudently as possible. Revenues, however, have fallen short of the budget due mostly to (1) Pledges, and (2) Fundraising. Current Year Pledges are behind budget by over \$17,000, but that is mostly attributable to a lag in pledge receipts during the summer months as well as timing issues in receipt of some pledge payments. Hopefully we will experience a resurgence in Pledge receipts now that school is back in session and attendance on Sundays is more stable. Fundraising's shortfall of over \$4,800 is due to a slight underperformance of JuneFest versus the budget, a delay in finalizing the FoodFest results, as well as a lack of other fundraising events as compared to this time last year, when we had already hosted a Pub Quiz and a Chili Cook-off. In August we had a successful BBQ on the lawn, and in October we had our annual dinner dance and auction. The Pub Quiz occurs in November, so hopefully these affordable fundraising events will help us reach the budget for Fundraising.

A Capital Campaign to Renovate our Sanctuary

I worship at St. Augustine's because I feel the Holy Spirit in our community, the mass and the simple, dignified beauty of our Sanctuary. But everything in this world, however old and beloved, requires renewal and renovation from time to time; not to change the essence of what we are as a Church, but to keep it vital. This next year, renewal needs to concentrate on our sanctuary.

In the past year we've seen many welcome improvements, from new heating plant (and air conditioning at last!), to new paint in the parish hall, and a new bathroom. But the big jobs are still to be done. In September, your Vestry examined our needs and options, and agreed on tentative priorities:

The Sanctuary needs a face lift. Removal of the old radiators finished off the old carpet, and the dingy, peeling, cracked walls and ceiling are, well, mildly depressing. Also, many pews need to be rebuilt, and new seating added. We want to keep pews, but many are kept from collapse by lumber braces and prayer.

Our biggest problem is water; where it goes and what it does. Our land is a natural bowl with no outlet, and our buildings sit in the middle of the bowl. The pressure of water has destroyed the mortar in our foundations. And fixing the brickwork will be for naught if we don't begin to drain water away from our buildings. We need new gutters. We need to put in drains around our buildings and a connection to the municipal storm drain down the street. And we need to work with the Village to redo the sidewalks so that they no longer trap water and become an ice rink in winter.

The mortar in our brickwork has leached and crumbled, especially around our foundations and is in urgent need of replacement. Our chimneys are in the same poor shape, and are leaking water into our new furnaces. Fixing our brickwork is our most pressing priority, and we have already drawn up specifications and put out a request for bids. This work should happen next summer.....if we have the money

To do these jobs next year we will need a capital campaign. Over the next few months we will be reaching out to each of you to study the feasibility of our plans. From the Vestry:

Upon learning that Bishop Sisk would be visiting St Augustine's, the members of the vestry unanimously agreed that the bishop's position regarding the marriage of same-sex couples within the churches of his diocese would have to be discussed. It was felt that Bishop Sisk's decision would affect a great many in the St A's community deeply and negatively, and that it was incumbent upon us as the elected leaders of the parish to voice our concerns.

Several points were adhered to with regard to our discussion with Bishop Sisk:

- We agreed that one member of the vestry would write (with input from the group) and read a statement of our collective feelings.
- We hoped that the statement would initiate a larger discussion on the issue, during which individual vestry men and women could share their thoughts and concerns and at which time we hoped Bishop Sisk would respond.
- The statement would be presented as a reflection of the opinion of the vestry only; because we did not have the time to survey the entire parish, we felt it would be wrong to suggest that we represented the congregation as a whole.

With all these points established, the following was prepared and read aloud to Bishop Sisk at our Nov. 6 meeting:

Bishop Sisk:

First and foremost, we want you to know that you have our love and our prayers. You also have our thanks for your years of service to the Church.

This said, our consciences compel us to voice our unhappiness with and objection to your decision regarding priests marrying gay couples at Episcopal churches in your diocese.

- First, as we understand it, your position may be expressed in this way:the Episcopal Church defines marriage as the union of a man and a woman;
- the Episcopal Church has granted bishops "generous pastoral response" with regard to the participation of their parishes and priests in the marriage of gay and lesbian couples;
- you support the legalization and recognition of gay marriages;
- you and the priests of your diocese vowed to uphold the doctrines of the Church;
- therefore you feel allowing anything more than a blessing of a marriage of a same-sex couple would violate of your vows and the vows of the participating priests.

We also understand that six bishops in New York have responded to the Church's position: four will allow priests in their diocese to marry same-sex couples. One will not allow gay marriages in churches in his diocese. You are the sixth. We feel it is important that you know our reactions to your decision:

- You have made us confused. You support the legalization of same-sex marriages and have argued in favor of these rights. Clearly you understand that a marriage need not be the union of a man and a woman. Yet, though granted a "generous pastoral response," you uphold an antiquated definition of the sacrament which seems to contrast with your own definition. We do not understand this.
- You have made us frustrated and, in some cases, angry. You offer to bless the legal unions of gay and lesbian couples, but deny them participation in the sacred union of marriage. Setting a different standard for participation in the sacraments of the Church for gay and straight people diminishes the meaning of the sacraments. All sacraments should surely be equally available to all the faithful. Our congregation embraces many gay and lesbian couples; as vestry, we cannot abide that our brothers and sisters are not permitted to fully participate in the life of their chosen faith. Indeed, our own pastor--a man whose expressions of love, compassion and devotion have strengthened the relationships of all those in his parish--upon finding someone with whom to share his life and soul and purpose, would not be welcome to seek a spiritual bond to that someone in his own church.
- You have made us sad. The pain we have felt on behalf of our fellow congregants as a result of your decision is of course one source of our sadness. And the sense of finality you have given to your decision is another source; to date we have not seen willingness on your part to reconsider. Undoubtedly you came to your conclusion on this matter after much soul-searching and careful consideration; we find it distressing that you see your influence limited to a legalistic interpretation of the situation rather than a more generous, loving and full pastoral understanding.

Four of New York's bishops and we as vestry wish to stand with and support the LGBTQ community, as Christ would have us do. Our sense is that you share this wish, but that you feel somehow limited in your ability to do so on this issue. The Church is the body of Christ, and as His body it is a living, breathing, organic and changeable thing. It is time to heal a part of that body, to make it whole. We hope you will work with us to find a way forward, one that will allow you to honor the dignity and integrity of your office, and one that will allow all to share in the beauty and sanctity of the marriage sacrament.

The St. A's Youth Group

The Youth Group is back with another epic community service project! We are helping Michaela O'Connell with her Girl Scout Gold Award project to work with a homeless shelter in the Bronx. The shelter is Susan's Place. If you are not familiar with this shelter, it helps women that have mental health issues. Once they move out of the shelter they have a home with nothing in it, and only a little bit of money.

The project is that we are collecting small household items so that the women can be given these items instead of having to purchase them. That way they can use the little bit of money they have for food. These are the items we are collecting:

- Cups and mugs
- Silverware
- Sheets and blankets
- Small appliances (lamps, toasters, etc.)
- Plates and bowls
- Toiletries
- Towels

The youth group will have a box that you can put your donations in, and we will bring the items to Michaela's house to be delivered to the shelter.

Also remember: the Youth Group is multi-tasking! We are still collecting soup!!!

Catherine Riedel and Rachel Norfleet lead the youth group again, with Brad's counsel and participation. Here's how it works:

SUNDAY SCHOOL is for 6th-8th graders weekly from 10:30-11:10 in the parish house. At 11:10 the class joins the congregation in church. The kids have the option of sitting together (we reserve a pew for this purpose) or with their families. Rachel is teaching the first block.
