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From the Rector:

October 2011: The Election of a Bishop!

Have you ever watched your new boss get interviewed and hired? If you did not know, right now, we in the Episcopal Diocese of New York are in that very situation... together. In the Episcopal Church, we elect our bishops. We are democratic. Clergy and lay people have a voice and vote. And on October 29th, the Diocese of New York will elect a new bishop. Laura Seitz, Penny Morgan and I will be your deputies. We will, hopefully, prayerfully elect an able bodied and prayerful person to be the next Bishop of New York.

But let's be honest! This is an election. We are human beings, and there is everything that you would expect as such. There are thoughtful candidates. There are those who are ambitious and shamelessly politic. And there are people who are genuinely prayerful. And there is representation from many different groups. Of the seven current candidates, two are African-American. One is an openly gay woman. Another is already a bishop somewhere else. There is another woman. Two are already in this diocese. And that's merely the tip of the iceberg. See more at [www.diocesen.org](http://www.diocesen.org).

Mostly, I write to commend the diocese and the St. A's contingent to your prayers... because we need them. This diocese has over 200 congregations with many and different needs. Many, like us, have faced serious financial difficulties in the past few years. Many are fairing more poorly than we. There are questions of whether we can sustain this many congregations. There are questions about how to prepare ourselves to be relevant to the needs of our surroundings, which range from Manhattan to Dutchess County. In other words, the person to be elected has a difficult and complex but important path ahead.

If you didn't know, the word Episcopal means "overseer" or "bishop". In other words, we are electing our namesake, someone to shepherd and in many ways define who we are as a group. Which means this is of utmost importance. I realize that with our government as it is, not to mention churches, many have given up on the concept of leadership well exercised. But I invite you to daydream for a minute, about what a good bishop could mean for us, about what good leadership could mean for everyone. It is like having a good, caring, and challenging boss.

There is much going on around St. A's right now. We are planning for another weekend at Heifer International. We have kicked off Sunday School with the help of Marie Fabian and great teachers. We have said goodbye to Chris Jones as a fellow parishioner. We are organizing for a capital campaign and applying for grants. And Bishop Sisk is coming in November. And I know that everyone is running around like squirrels before winter. But even in the middle of these activities, I invite you to help us pray for a good overseer. I don't know about you, but I hope that church is a place that inspires us, consoles us, transforms us, and challenges us, all in the name of God. And that vision should be present in our pews (as it is here), at the altar, and even in our elected bishops. We live in hope.

Treasurers Report: Our operating performance for the first eight months of 2011 reflects the slowdown in revenues we typically experience during the summer months; our actual shortfall of revenues over expenditures is in excess of -\$18,000 v. the -\$5,000 contained in the budget. This means that the revenues we have received to date were not sufficient to pay all of our bills, and we have had to dip into our reserves. Expenses have been slightly lower than expected in most categories as we continue to operate our church and other buildings and programs as prudently as possible. Revenues, however, have fallen short of the budget due mostly to (1) Pledges, and (2) Fundraising. Current Year Pledges are behind budget by over \$18,000, but that is mostly attributable to a lag in pledge receipts during the summer months as well as timing issues in receipt of some pledge payments. Hopefully we will experience a resurgence in Pledge receipts once school is back in session and attendance on Sundays is more stable. Fundraising's shortfall of over \$4,700 is due to a slight underperformance of JuneFest versus the budget, a delay in finalizing the FoodFest results, as well as a lack of other fundraising events as compared to this time last year, when we had already hosted a Pub Quiz and a Chili Cook-off. August saw a very successful BBQ on the lawn, and hopefully we can plan more fun and affordable fundraising events in the near future, which would help us reach the budget for Fundraising.

### *Adult Education offering - Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>*

Everyone over the age of 40 remembers hearing verses, recited or intoned aloud, from the King James Version of the Bible. Charlton Heston comes to mind. Very little of what is heard nowadays comes from that version of scripture, except in the Evangelical churches, but in fact, for some of them, the KJV is the only authentic Bible; all others are held to be unworthy or even heretical. That includes the one we use, the New Revised Standard Version.

The KJV, also called the "Authorized Version", was commissioned by King James the First in 1604, and was published in 1611. 60 or more scholars were involved in the work. We will examine the KJV, its history, its political origins, its language, its difficulties, and, in particular, the rules the translators were required to follow in the process of producing a Bible that would, by royal decree, officially replace all Bibles previously in use in England. We'll examine key passages as they appear in the KJV and, by contrast, in other versions.

One source in particular will be used in preparation: God's Secretaries, by Adam Nicholson, published by Harper, 2003. But Note: This is not a Book Group project, and purchase of this book is not a requirement for participation. On the other hand, it would be good to search out Grandmother's KJV from the shelves at home, and even any old Concordances or other commentaries on the KJV that may have survived.

### *The St. A's Youth Group*

We got off to a good start last year, and this year we are even more organized! Catherine Riedel and I are leading the youth group again, with Brad's counsel and participation. Here's how it works:

SUNDAY SCHOOL is for 6th – 8th graders weekly from 10:30 – 11:10 in the parish house. At 11:10 the class will join the congregation in church. The kids have the option of sitting together (we reserve a pew for this purpose) or with their families. I am teaching the first block. If you are interested in teaching a block, please let me or Marie Fabian know.

YOUTH GROUP is for 6th through 9th graders. It will meet twice a month: once during the regular Sunday school time (the children's service weeks), and once on a Sunday evening from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m. These evening meetings will incorporate dinner.
