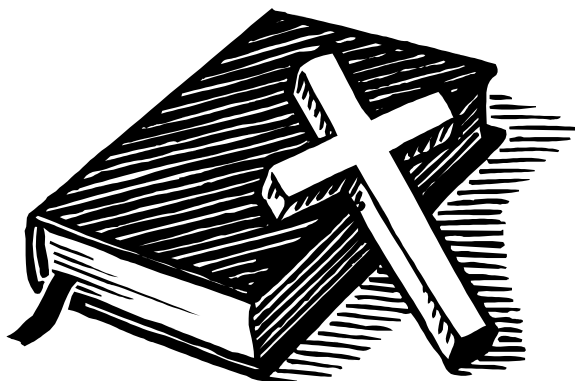

Gospel = Good News

Did you know that the word "Gospel" literally means **Good News**? Well, it does. Now, aren't you proud of your priest's translating abilities? You should be! But the point is an important one. We are about proclaiming **Good News**! While much of the world continues to be in Recession and to see only scarcity, our task and journey is to see and offer an abundance of what we do have. We, like many, might not have an abundance of money, but we do have a treasure trove of kindness, generosity, and love. There is much **Good News** at St. Augustine's. And although I cannot share it all in this column, here is a smattering, an offering. It is our Gospel according to St. Augustine's.

First off, the good and great news is that although we are still dealing with financial difficulties, we have been dealt some wonderful gifts! Junefest was a wonderful success, thanks to the efforts of so many. And, we applied for and have been awarded a grant from the Diocese. This grant will cover the costs of having music at our second service on Sundays. This grant will allow us to be more creative with musical offerings at the 10:30 AM service while still having a choir at the 9:00 AM service

As part of this grant, we will also be forming a new **Worship Committee**. The aim of this committee will be to enrich our liturgies. We will be assessing how our service schedule works, and we will be planning new alternatives. Possibilities include our own St. A's Eucharistic Prayer, our own Prayers of the People, and perhaps additional services at other times, including more contemplative options. Our first meeting will be on **Sunday, October 25th**, after church services, approximately 11:45 AM. Please note the date on your calendar and join us.


Many of us have also begun a project to help beautify the parish house. I am calling it our St. Augustine's WPA project (unfortunately, without the pay). As a way of sprucing up our parish house, we are going to have different works of art in the Sunday School classrooms. The themes will be selected from our Sunday School Curriculum. And the works will be connected together as though they form a new altarpiece. Some of the older grades will make their own part of the altarpiece. And over the course of years, we can add to our expressions.

The fact that we have had about 10 artists willing to help in this endeavor is amazing!

Another bit of good news is that parishioner Chris Jones is exploring a potential call to the priesthood. She has been meeting with a discernment committee made up of Senior Warden Duncan Cleary, Debbie Ramsey, Cathie Elliot, David Wixted, and Kathy West. They will continue meeting through the fall. Chris has even preached her first sermon here! Although none of us know where this could lead Chris, I invite you to keep her in your prayers. No matter what happens, she will need lots of support from her parish family.

Of course, all of this Gospel happens alongside our normal Fall schedule. There is our soup kitchen effort, Sunday School, a Sunday School party, an auction/dinner in October, a potential trip to Nicaragua, book-group discussions, adult education classes, the Heifer Project Trip, and a whole host of other ventures. And we are still proclaiming THE Good News: *God's love*. And this is the most important. The reason that we put any effort into this place, the reason that there is Good News, is because we ourselves have felt love and God here. And we hope to continue that Good News most of all!

Treasurer's Report:

We have ended the first half of the year with a surplus larger than the one contained in the budget, most of which is attributable to JuneFest. We have also done an excellent job in managing our expenses, which has also attributed to our improved operations. JuneFest was budgeted to generate \$14,000 for operations; we actually made just over \$22,000 (we did not budget for a dinner and auction during JuneFest this year). Also, FoodFest brought in just under \$3,000, although not all of the winners have yet paid. These two sources of revenue will help us through the summer months, when pledge income drops significantly. Also, with regard to pledges, it is important to keep in mind that: (1) the budget assumed receipt of \$130,000 in pledges, as compared to the less than \$120,000 we actually received, and (2) the monthly payment of the \$120,000 in actual pledges had recently been lagging expectations (it has since improved, and we are slightly ahead of expectations for the quarter).

Of more concern, however, is the outlook for the remainder of 2009, especially as we head into the slower summer months. The \$130,000 in pledges in the 2009 budget still resulted in a reduction in programs and services offered during 2009. Each employee experienced a cut in hours or salary,

including Father Brad. With cuts in salaries, hours, and programs, as well as the use of another \$5,000 from the Memorial Fund for operations, we were finally able to present to Vestry a balanced budget for 2009, with pledges anticipated at \$130,000. With actual pledges of less than \$120,000, however, we will need to either raise an additional \$10,000 above and beyond the revenues contained in the budget, or cut another \$10,000 of salaries, hours, programs and services. In the meantime, we will be faced with many challenges as we attempt to operate the church we love with less financial resources than it takes to keep our employees employed, to keep our church insured, warm and lit, and to fund our music, education and outreach programs.

Book Group

The next meeting of the St A's Book Group will be **Sunday, October 4th**. We will be discussing **LIFE OF PI**, written by Yann Martel. *Life of Pi* is the story of a 16-year old Indian boy adrift at sea for 227 days with only a dangerous Bengal tiger for a companion. Pi Patel's journey, and survival through the use of his wits and sheer determination, is one that grabs you and never lets go. It's a story that seems both too real and surreal at the same time.

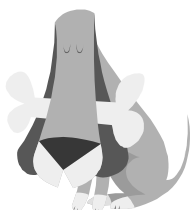
The group will meet after the 10:30 AM service in the parish house. Everyone is invited. If you are interested in leading this discussion group please contact Kim or Brad in the Parish office.

EFM – Education for Ministry

Did you ever wonder what it meant in Genesis when the author writes about creation, “God said, “Let *us* make man in *our* own image”?

Did you know that at the end of his career, after seeing “the clouds open” when he baptized Jesus, and seeing all of his “signs and wonders”, etc., John the Baptist still had to ask Jesus if he really was the Messiah?

Did you know that James, Jesus’ brother headed up the powerful Jerusalem Jewish church after Jesus died, despite what some of the gospels tell us that his own family considered Jesus “mad” and “out of his mind”?

Why did some early house church members actually “curse” the name “Jesus”, as Paul references in one of his letters?

And these are just a few questions from only the Biblical studies section of the weekly agenda in our *Education for Ministry* (EFM) classes.

EFM to me has been some of the most thought-provoking, creative, reflective and satisfying hours that I spend each week away from the rush of the everyday routine. Some classmates minister in hospitals, some to prisoners, others to their immediate and needing families. We have members whose careers have aided the rural poor in legal matters, who work for worldwide organizations promoting peace and development and others on their way to becoming deacons promoting outreach. God forbid, we even have a Republican in our group!

EFM involves reading scripture, reflecting on commentary, discussing philosophy, leading worship, offering prayer and listening to others. We write our own creeds, share our spiritual autobiographies, and prepare our own liturgies. There’s humor, dissention, individuality and genuine care amongst our classmates.

For those who are serious about their spiritual being, their relationship to God and their living the Good News, EFM is the vehicle to explore and challenge. I urge anyone who is so moved, to inquire about this great program. We start up again next fall.

Mission Trip to Ticuantepe, Nicaragua By St. A's Parishioner, Kamalini Martin

Take a trip to Ticuantepe, *the hill of the fierce* and you'll return wanting to *climb every mountain*. It's something that I would highly recommend if you want to do some good, see a new country and have fun at the same time.

I went with a group of 21 from St. John's Episcopal Church in Larchmont; 15 teenagers, 5 men and one woman. Most of the group was repeaters and one of the kids was going for the fourth time and as he put it "How can I not come back year after year?" If there was some way that every teen could have this experience it would make a world of difference to their life and help realize that we have so much to be thankful for and that we must do everything we can to help those who are less fortunate than we are.

Ticuantepe, just outside Managua, is a village that subsists on white pineapple plantations. Mango trees and banana plantations abound but the living conditions were rough-bunk cots in a tiny three roomed house, no running water, bucket baths in an outdoor stall and a hole in the ground for a toilet. Rice and beans were served three times a day with slight variations which

included eggs and fresh fruit. A piece of chicken one day and guacamole were much cause for celebration, as was the daily visit of the ice cream man.

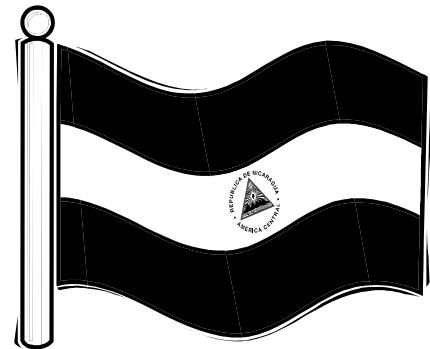
Building a one room house with concrete walls, entailed hard work; from lifting cement blocks, mixing sand and gravel, carting buckets of water, stones and cement to bending steel and pouring mortar. The villagers pitched in and even the kids lent a hand. There was time to climb trees and pick mangoes, play soccer and give the kids piggyback rides. The evenings were spent getting to know each other better and on the last day the whole village came out for a fiesta of music and dancing.

We built two houses for one extended family. They were happy and proud that we had completed as much as we did. Professional masons would put on the tin roof and complete the job

Our first and last night were spent in a hotel and we did some sightseeing around Managua, the capital, and Granada, a beautiful town dating back to the Spanish in 1529. The **Bridges to Community** staff accompanied us everywhere so there was always someone at hand to help translate and make things comfortable, like when the roof leaked, somebody got a terrible insect bite, and one of the kids had a nasty infection from a barbed wire cut.

Although we were greeted at the airport by masked officials and had to go through infra red machines to check for swine flu, none of the group fell ill despite the very basic living arrangements.

I would love to see a group from St. As take a trip like this one to Nicaragua.
